National Day for Truth and Reconciliation - September 30

September 30th is the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation in Canada. This day is an important step towards recognizing and addressing the historical and ongoing injustices faced by Indigenous Peoples. As an organization, 2023 marks the first year that Ecology Ottawa recognized it as a holiday for staff, with our offices being closed on Monday, Oct 2. This allows our staff to take time to reflect on the Truth and Reconciliation process and the role we can play in supporting Indigenous communities in their journey towards healing and justice. We encourage individual learning and participation in community events on this important day to foster a deeper understanding of the impact and legacy of colonialism and the residential school programs.

Global Climate Strike 2023



The Global Climate Strike, which took place from September 20th to 27th, saw millions of individuals worldwide taking to the streets to demand urgent action on climate

change. Here in Ottawa, hundreds of Ottawans came out to demand the end of fossil fuels at Parliament Hill.

Budget 2024

Ottawa City Council will be determining the budget for 2024 this fall, as they do every fall. A city's budget is crucial to its operations and the lives of its constituents: the budget represents in very real terms a city's priorities. In a time of concurrent crises, it is important that real investments are made to protect our environment and our community. It's crucial that Council gets Budget 2024 right. We're calling for council to:

- Fully fund the implementation of the Climate Change Master Plan (CCMP)
- Accelerate implementation of the Urban Forest Management Plan (UFMP)
- Reverse cuts to public transit, and instead invest.
- Accelerate implementation of active transportation infrastructure in the Transportation Master Plan.
- Implement a bikeshare system, and create subsidies for electric-assist bicycles

Keep an eye out for our piece in the <u>PEN_Newsletter</u> where we have prepared a number of points that we'd like to see in Budget 2024. We encourage you to contact your councillor about these points, whether by email or by speaking with them. In addition to contacting your city councilor, many councilors will be hosting budget consultation sessions leading up to debate and adoption of Budget 2024 in early December. Have your say on the Proposed Amendment to streamline the City of Ottawa's Tree Protection By-law

In June 2022, Council directed staff to consult with the public on amending the Tree Protection By-law to reduce the size of Distinctive Trees in the suburban area of Ottawa from 50 to 30 cm in diameter measured at breast height. This change would bring the tree by-law permitting rules for the suburbs in line with those for the inner urban area of Ottawa.

The City of Ottawa is requesting input through a survey available on <u>Engage Ottawa</u>, which will be available until October 10, 2023.

Land Alliance March

On September 27th, 2023 five First Nations from Northern Ontario came to Toronto to lead a march calling on Premier Ford to end unwanted mining activity on their Territories. These five strong First Nations have formed a historic alliance to protect their lands and waters in the face of mounting concerns about encroachment on their territories by mining exploration companies who have been enabled by the Ford Government.
